Cradle Mountain access

Cradle Mountain lies at the northern end of the Cradle Mountain-Lake St Clair National Park. It is $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours from Devonport via the B19 and B14 south to Sheffield, then C136 and C132 to the park entrance.

From Launceston, it is a 2 1/2 hour drive on the Bass Highway (A1), then the signposted route via B13 and C156 through Sheffield.

From the west, drive 2 hours along the A10 and C132 from Queenstown or 1 1/2 hours from Burnie via B18 through Ridgley, then the A10 and C132 to reach the park.

There is no direct road link through the Cradle Mountain- Lake St Clair National Park to join the two ends of the park. Visitors may most easily reach Lake St Clair via the Cradle Link Road (C132) and the Muchison and Lyell Highways (A10).

Caravans, campervans, motorhomes and trailers, as well as vehicles over 6.5 tonnes and/or vehicles over 8 metres in length are not permitted in the National Park. These vehicles will need to be left at the Cradle Mountain Visitor Centre and Transit Terminal car park. Visitors can use a shuttle bus or approved tour bus to access Dove Lake and other day walk areas. For commercial and school group vehicle guidelines <u>click here</u>.

Cradle Shuttle Bus

McDermotts Coaches operates a shuttle bus service on behalf of the Parks and Wildlife Service. The shuttle bus service operates between the Visitors Centre and Transit Terminal, located at the former airstrip to Dove Lake. The service is aimed at protecting the important values of the World Heritage Area while also preserving the visitor experience.

The service has been highly successful in reducing visitor traffic on the road to Dove Lake by one-third. It has attracted a highly favourable response from Tasmanian, interstate and overseas visitors since its introduction.

The shuttle service operates seven days a week. In addition to your Park Pass fee, a charge for the use of the shuttle bus service may apply.

Due to the high visitation at Cradle Mountain throughout the year, visitors are encouraged to leave cars at the Visitors Centre and Transit Terminal (located 2km *before* the park boundary) and take the shuttle bus service to the Interpretation Centre and Ranger Station, Snake Hill, Ronny Creek, Waldheim, and Lake Dove. A boom gate controls vehicle access to the park and on days of high visitation all visitors (including those with an annual pass) are encouraged to return to the Transit Centre and use the shuttle bus service. **Public transport and tours**

From the car park, you can use the <u>shuttle bus</u> or approved tour bus to get to Dove Lake and other day walk areas.

No access for ...

You will not be able to come into the park with:

- caravans
- campervans
- motorhomes
- trailers
- vehicles weighing more than 6.5t or longer than 8m.

Shuttle bus-getting around in the national park

The shuttle bus runs every day from the visitor centre to and from:

• Interpretation Centre and Ranger Station

- Snake Hill
- Ronny Creek
- Waldheim
- Dove Lake.

Taking a shuttle bus means you can still visit world heritage areas like these without damaging their values. We've already found that it reduced traffic on the road to Dove Lake by one third.

Since we introduced the shuttle bus, we have had good responses from Tasmanians, and interstate and overseas visitors.

There might be an extra fee for using the shuttle bus on top of your Park Pass fee.
